

Factsheet: Free-of-charge (FOC) Items

In this factsheet PSNC's Dispensing and Supply team explains what items are classed as free-of-charge (FOC) when prescribed on NHS prescription forms.

Free-of-charge contraceptives

Prescription charges are NOT payable for drugs used for contraceptive purposes and certain contraceptive appliances (as referenced in Part XVI Clause 10 of the Drug Tariff), when prescribed on NHS prescription forms. Contraceptive drugs listed in Part XVI Clause 10 of the Drug Tariff are automatically identified and processed as free-of-charge (FOC) items by the NHS Business Services Authority (NHSBSA). The same applies to contraceptive devices and applicators listed in the Appliances section (Part IXA) of the Drug Tariff. These items do not need to be annotated for contraceptive use by the prescriber and a prescription charge should not be levied for these products.

Prescriptions for any other drug not specified in Part XVI of the Drug Tariff but intended for contraceptive purposes must be annotated by the prescriber with either 'CC', 'OC' or the female symbol (\bigcirc) to indicate that no prescription charge should be levied. For EPS, prescribers need to apply the correct 'CC' endorsement against the drug intended for contraceptive purposes so that it is recognised and processed as a FOC item by the pharmacy and the NHSBSA. Prescribers must not free-type the 'CC' endorsement or similar in the 'free text' fields of the electronic prescription as this information is not extracted by the NHSBSA for reimbursement purposes. If the required prescriber endorsements are absent or are incorrectly written on a prescription for any drug not specified in Part XVI but intended for contraceptive purposes, the usual prescription charges would apply unless the patient holds a valid exemption reason from paying NHS prescriptions charges. 'FS' endorsement for 'Free Supply'

Prescribers can apply the 'FS' (for 'free supply') prescriber endorsement against certain items to indicate that a charge should not be levied for the endorsed item(s). Currently the 'FS' endorsement is only approved for use by prescribers to enable FOC supply of sexual health treatments.

Any item prescribed for the treatment on a sexually transmitted infection (STI) must be endorsed with 'FS' by the prescriber in order not to attract a prescription charge. The 'FS' endorsement, if applied correctly, will indicate to pharmacy teams that a patient who normally pays for their prescriptions should not be charged for any items correctly endorsed 'FS' by the prescriber. There is no defined list of drugs for STI to which the 'FS' prescriber endorsement can be applied to; prescribers should use their clinical discretion to determine when to apply the 'FS' endorsement when prescribing items for treatment of STIs.

In EPS, the 'FS' endorsement must be present in the prescriber endorsement field. The 'FS' endorsement should **NOT** be manually added by a prescriber to the free-text EPS dosage area or notes field as this information is not visible to the NHSBSA during prescription pricing. If an electronic prescription is received with the prescriber 'FS' endorsement contained within the dosage area, the prescriber should be contacted for a replacement prescription with the 'FS' endorsement applied correctly. Prescribers should **NOT** include 'FS' endorsed items on the same prescription form as other chargeable items. For electronic prescriptions with 'FS' endorsed items only, the message code 'Y' (0017) can be populated before an EPS claim is submitted for payment (some PMR systems may automatically apply this code if only 'FS' endorsed items are prescribed). If the 'FS' prescriber endorsement cannot be correctly applied to applicable items on electronic prescriptions, prescribers should revert to issuing paper prescriptions with 'FS' endorsed manually against each item intended for the treatment of an STI.

On paper FP10 prescription forms, the initials 'FS' and the prescriber's signature should be annotated by hand alongside the item being prescribed for STI treatment. There is no patient tick box for FOC sexual health treatments on the reverse of the paper FP10 prescriptions/FP10DT tokens. Paper prescriptions for 'FS' endorsed must be placed in the exempt red separator before a prescription bundle is submitted for payment to ensure that operators at the NHSBSA can identify and process 'FS' endorsed items as FOC.

FAQs

Q. What does a patient pay for a prescription that has both a contraceptive and another item on it?

A. Ideally, prescribers should not include items classed as FOC (for e.g. contraceptives) on the same prescription form as a chargeable item. Where such prescriptions are received, the table below highlights whether a patient would pay a prescription charge using different examples of contraceptive-containing prescriptions:

FAQs (continued)

Q. Why are patients with STIs entitled to receive their treatment for free on the NHS?

A. Existing legislation under the NHS Act 2006 provides for free-of-charge treatment for sexually transmitted diseases (STDs). Many patients often receive treatment for STIs free-of-charge from local sexual health (GUM) clinics. Where these treatments for STI are supplied by way of an FP10 prescription form, there is currently no mechanism or operational arrangement for exempting the patient from the prescription charge, so patients may be charged for medicines that should be supplied for free. The 'FS' endorsement has been developed as a technical solution to allow free supply of items used for the treatment of STIs.

Q. How should contractors process prescriptions with 'FS' only items and mixed items ('FS' and non-FS) for both exempt and non-exempt patients?

A. The table below highlights how to process prescriptions with 'FS' only items and mixed items ('FS' and non-FS) for both exempt and non-exempt patients
