Overview	National Care Record Service will replace the Summary Care Record application (SCRa) portal.
Proposed action	The group is to be updated and to discuss developments.

<u>The National Care Records Service (NCRS)</u> is being introduced as a new interface available from within the Spine portal link directory to provide national patient information for health and care staff. NCRS will be a successor to the <u>Summary Care Record</u> application (SCRa) portal.

NCRS enables view of SCR information but additionally:

- Personal Demographics Service;
- National Record Locator to locally held care plans
- Reasonable Adjustments Flag.
- Child Protection Information Sharing

Information within NCRS is consumable by IT system suppliers.

All authorised health and care professionals can access the National Care Records Service using mobile or desktop device connected to the internet using WiFi, mobile data or an existing Health and Social Care Network (HSCN). The NCRS offers multiple access options including biometric authentication or smartcards. The NCRS was piloted in a range of different health and care settings including within Weldricks pharmacies. It is now being 'fully rolled out' following the success of the pilots.

Overview	The core information standard defines a set of information that can potentially be shared between systems in different sites and settings, among professionals and people using services.
Proposed action	The group is to be updated and to discuss developments.

## Core Information Standard and records standards

PRSB consulted on whether the <u>Core Information Standard</u> (CIS) suited Shared Care Records usage within the community pharmacy sector. PRSB's workshop participants strongly supported pharmacy professionals and patients having access to the information within the CIS. PRSB are exploring how GP Connect records information could provide a useful interim measure for settings without comprehensive Shared Care Records information, and feedback indicates GP Connect information would support service delivery. PRSB want to see records programmes and IT systems aligning to coded standards. Existing PRSB standards cross reference to coded FHIR standards, e.g. <u>Medicine and Allergy/Intolerance Data Transfer standard</u>.

Previously the CP ITG has continued to welcome an underlying expanded coded standard so that a supplier integrating with ShCR, SCR and GP Connect could integrate with any other record system easily.

Overview	GP Connect: Access Record allows clinicians to view a read-only version of the patient's detailed GP practice record.

CP ITG has previously been updated about the <u>GP Connect 'Access Records'</u> programme.

Past CP ITG updates have included discussions surrounding:

- The GP Connect Access Record programme allows authorised clinicians access to GP patient records in a HTML read-only or an editable format. NHS Digital's focus will be on the GP Connect structured API.
- The GP Connect Access Records project is not intended as a full replacement for the Shared Care Record (ShCR). However, there could be scope for specific use cases where GP Connect information supports pharmacy delivery of services – subject to some development being completed by prescribing system suppliers.

Overview	Shared Care Records (ShCR) are patients' local electronic health records. These include information from multiple care settings.
Proposed action	The group is to be updated and to discuss developments.

## Shared Care Records updates

- Shared Care Records (ShCR), formerly 'Local health and shared care records', are patients' electronic health records. ShCRs include information from multiple care settings, e.g. GP practice and secondary care. Most English patients live within an area with a records project ongoing. LPCs and/or local contractors can continue to take steps to gain pharmacy access and should use the guidance set out at the 'Engagement' section of the <u>community pharmacy and ShCRs</u> webpage. Newer guidance documents include: <u>ShCR checklist for local areas (CP ITG template)</u> and <u>ShCR usage guide (pharmacy) template</u> (comments about these new templates can be directed to <u>it@psnc.org.uk</u>).
- PSNC published a ShCR case study: <u>Somerset Shared Care Record case study</u> (<u>SIDeR</u>). Digitalhealth.net reported that <u>Somerset Integrated Digital ShCR is</u> now being used 13,000 times a month (by a mixture of healthcare settings).
- PSNC continues to work with the NHS England's Transformation Directorate and other relevant stakeholders on the actions set out within the <u>Shared Care Record</u> (<u>ShCR/LHCR</u>) <u>NHS</u> <u>Transformation Directorate and pharmacy outputs</u> and <u>actions</u>. During this 2021 event the CP ITG participants had flagged some of the challenges with the local variability of IG and technical protocols for the varying ShCR projects. Some of the developments since then are outlined within <u>ShCR</u> <u>developments (as of November 2022)</u>.

### **Records**

- SCR AI changes continued beyond COVID-19 legislation which expired at the end of June 2022. PSNC and the Community Pharmacy IT Group have campaigned for pharmacy teams' access to SCR AI to be extended beyond the pandemic by sharing case study information. If you have any examples of how SCR with AI has enhanced patient care, in comparison to the normal SCR access, please contact it@psnc.org.uk, as such examples could be used to support the case for permanent access to SCR with AI and other health records for pharmacy.
- PSNC conducted some interviews with pharmacists that frequently used ShCR systems. Some of the comments about ShCR and GP Connect Access Record programme included the below:
  - If there is integration with both, this provides continuity if one system experiences an outage.
  - ShCRs and GP Connect each have some of their own benefits and challenges.
  - ShCR records can include structured information from across multi sectors e.g. helping with the delivery of Discharge Medicines Service (DMS) when discharge information can reach the pharmacy before the GP Practice.
  - GP Connect records are useful for a lot of dispensing work, but record data from other settings does not always impact the GP record swiftly and in a structured way.

## IT policy: Integrated Care Systems (ICS)

techUK published a report on <u>What should ICS prioritise to make digital, data and technology work for them and their populations? (pdf report)</u>. The report was written in collaboration with techUK's Health and Social Care Council, the supplier community. It includes case studies and five key recommendations for ICS. <u>UKauthority.com reported on the techUK's work</u>.





- HSJ.co.uk opined on how ICSs could best benefit from digital technology.
- Better's Chief Technology Officer commented on the digital challenges with ICSs achieving integrated care.
- Integrating Digital Health and Care 2022 webinars were made available as videos on-demand. These videos explored the digital innovation and integration taking place and the latest in the development of ICSs.
